I'm writing this while doing the CQ WW That is 500 Watt RTTY contest, as a Multi-Operator Single phone. This can a Transmitter station. The bands are poor to 40 and 80 meters.

fair, with the A index = 26, SF=68 and K=4. What this means is that the low bands are noisy, and the bands above 20mtrs are dead. But this does not mean that there is no propagation!! We have worked 116 DX countries and over 700 Q's in the last 24 hours. We even worked a couple of VK's and ZL's on 40mtr! Even though this is the bottom of the sunspot cycle does not mean that all the bands are dead, just some of them. So get out there and work the DX and the contests! For a look at how the solar cycle is doing see:

http://www.dxlc.com/solar/ This site has a wealth of info available on the solar cycles and sunspots.

What helps when there are no sunspots? Better antennas and NOT assuming the bands are dead. The contest I'm doing right now shows that there is propagation to somewhere in the world any time. I have put up a couple of new wires, one for the WARC bands and a dipole for 40mtrs, tuned to the low end for cw and rtty. The 40mtr dipole does work better than the G5RV I normally use. I have up a 15mtr dipole, leaving the G5RV as my main antenna for 10.20 and 80 mtrs. I also use a small tri-band on the roof tower, the Cushcraft The A3S is normally only used for A3S. SO2R for the second radio. Want better antennas? Try a dipole cut for the portion of the band you use, resulting in a SWR under 1.5 to 1 so you don't need a tuner. Also make sure the orientation is broadside to the direction that most interests you. Add a small triband beam if you can, the extra gain will be noticed! The best help for the low bands is 500 Watts or more on TX! Small desktop tube amps can be had for less than \$800 used, and just over \$1000 new. That is 500 Watts on RTTY and 1KW on phone. This can make a BIG difference on

The other is the need of a more streamlined logging system with the possibility of using a server as the main system which is hooked up to a stable power system. I may look at this as a club project since there is an abundance of computer people who can provide some valuable input to this. My station was set up to a solar unit hooked up to a battery. This worked out good and found out that I can sustain myself better if there was more solar charging, so I am thinking about a 125 watt panel with a battery system that will provide some versatility without the use of a generator.

The results of the "contest" were submitted by me and the ARRL has it on record. Hopefully the points will stand which was over 2000 points. Well done everybody! The challenge for next year is to improve, on the score, the participation, the set-up, and most of all....The fun! Keep next year in mind and join us. We are looking at a new playground, the Academy Hill bandstand in Westminster which will give us more exposure and room for more toys, and of course more operators (hint, hint).


