13 Colonies planning Underway

The planning for the 2024 13 Colonies Special Event stations is in motion. I am looking for more ops for K2H Massachusetts.

The event runs from July 1 to July 7 and is usable on all frequencies and all modes. You just need to keep a log that you can submit to me right after the event ends. To be an op, you just need to volunteer AND be able to get on the air for a few hours most of the 7 days. Also, you need to be able to log on to a computer, no paper logs accepted.

Have you ever wondered or wanted to be that rare DX that everyone is calling? That's what it's like being a K2H op. It's a rush and a ton of fun.

Last year, K2H made 19,209 contacts. With band conditions good, we hope to exceed that and possibly beat our 21,374 from 2022.

POTA Activations By Glen KC1EIJ

It all began by mentioning to my friend, N1PCZ Paul, that I heard about this ham radio activity where you set up a portable station and communicate with lots of other hams. Activators set up in a park and hunters try to make contact with the activator. It sounded like fun and it fit with my interest in becoming proficient in emergency communication.

It wasn't long before I heard Paul saying that he was torturing his credit card with purchases of a FT-891 and antenna, along with a RigExpert, and... well you all get the idea, there's no such thing as having too much gear. Is there?

He invited me along as a "second operator" in late fall of last year and we "activated" a couple of parks. I think I was along to help carry the gear since we hiked about a half a mile or so into the woods. I was fascinated watching



him set up the antenna while I figured out the lightweight "chairs" and "table" (if you google backpacking gear you'll see what I'm talking about.) After tuning the antenna with the counterpoise we set about calling "CQ POTA!" I was hooked.

That was early December so there were few outdoor activations before it got too cold to be sitting out in the woods. Then we began activating from parks where we could park within the boundaries. The setup was a pretty simple 17' Chameleon whip on a fender mount on Paul's Jeep Rubicon. I learned what a "rove" is: spending a day going from park to park, a minimum of five constitutes a rove. We've done a few over the winter.

Finally, it was time for me to gear up myself. I was not okay with torturing my Visa like Paul had, so I started with a used FT-100D and started gathering. The fender mount for my truck is homemade, holding the same Chameleon 17' whip as Paul, and it has worked out well. My first solo activation was in the parking lot at Mt. Wachusett State Park at the end of

February.

Now I felt that it was time to put together a POTA setup for activations where hiking was necessary. Looking at the amount of gear Paul carried; a Pelican case for the radio and battery, bags for the antenna and another for a tripod as well as bags for chairs and table, I decided my POTA kit would be a backpack that contained everything, except furniture. If you want the details on my backpack you'll have to come to the April meeting to see my kit and how it all fits in a 25lb pack that I can hike with.

How does it work? Pretty good, I've already had a successful picnic table activation at Leominster State Forest with my rig, pulling hunters in from as far away as Sweden, Italy, and Spain.
